

A Leader and Gentleman for the Ages

We are deeply saddened with the CMSgt (Ret) Bradford passing of Denham on October 26. He was 75 years old. Chief Denham retired from the Air Force in 1988 after 28 years of service. Later he served as President of Chapter 751 in the early 90s and many of the programs he introduced are still in place today. He is credited with taking the Chapter from one whose small meetings took place in living rooms to the most professional organization active Wright Patterson AFB. Several years ago, Chapter 751 established the Chief Master Sergeant Bradford Denham Scholarship, awarded to a Community College of the Air Force graduate. recent years he attended the Chapter 751 Awards Banquet each January to present the NCO of the Year Award. In January 2016, he was awarded the Chapter's Exemplary Service Award.

Former Chapter 751 President, SMSgt (Ret) Chris Stanley, provided the eulogy in the presence of family and friends, including members of the Chief's AFSA family who made the trip to Tennessee.

"Chief Denham," said Stanley, "was an Air Force member who attained the highest enlisted rank; he deserved that (and more) and he was rightfully proud of that.

"I first met Brad Denham in early 1994 after I came to Wright Patterson AFB. He was the President of Chapter 751 and he welcomed me in with open arms. Brad

was a dynamic Chapter President who took the Chapter from one of mostly retirees (and barely getting by) to one of mostly active duty military. We grew into one of the largest and best Chapters in the Association due primarily to his leadership and the foundation he established.

"I subsequently became the Chapter President and, although Brad was not large in physical stature, I had incredibly large shoes to fill – not to mention huge expectations to live up to."

Chapter 751 was fortunate to call Chief Denham one of our own and he will leave behind a legacy of honor and integrity. Those who were lucky to know him personally will remember him not only as a true gentleman, but also a gentle man full of love; a love of family, friends, his wife of 53 years, Karen, and yes...a love for Chapter 751.



Ms. Jeanette Monaghan was the Air Force Marathon coordinator who worked with all the team captains and she truly is




A runner speeds by AFSA volunteers after taking a drink during the Air Force Marathon on September 17.






